#### TEJON'S 175th ANNIVERSARY . . .

Threatened with the loss of their lands to the north, Mexico began to issue land grants to their most respected citizens in the 1840's. The earliest grant in our mountain area was that of Rancho San Emigdio in 1842. It was located at the bottom of San Emigdio Canyon along the most traveled inland route called El Camino Viejo.

Then, between 1843 and 1846, four more land grants were issued, three in 1843 (Rancho El Tejon, Rancho Los Alamos y Agua Caliente and Rancho Castac) and Rancho La Liebre in 1846. The grantees had to prove up their claims by building and occupying an adobe structure and running herds of cattle.

By 1855, the Superintendent of Indian Affairs for the state, Edward Beale, had fallen in love with the area and purchased the Liebre grant which was some distance from the Reservation at the bottom of Grapevine Canyon. In 1865, when the government failed to ratify treaties with the local Indians, Mr. Beale, then the Surveyor General of California, also purchased the land that the reservation was located on, Rancho El Tejon, and made jobs available to the Indians that had settled there. That same year he purchased Rancho Los Alamos y Agua Caliente located further to the south near the Liebre Rancho and Rancho Castac – in the area of Grapevine Canyon.

These ranchos together became today's Rancho El Tejon comprising nearly 300,000 acres – the largest contiguous land holding in the state. The future of Tejon Ranch has been preserved in the Tejon Land Conservancy of 240,000 acres (which is celebrating their 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this year). Tejon Ranch continues efforts to develop commercial and residential areas along the Interstate 5 corridor.

The history of the Ranchos and Edward Beale is covered in detail in Volume 3 of Bonnie Kane's series of books entitled "A View from the Ridge Route: The Ranchos", available online and in our bookstore.

#### OUR MEMBERS SHARE . . .

We have recently heard from Dick and Peggy Hart. Their father, George Hart, worked in the refinery division of the General Petroleum Plant at Lebec – at the entrance to Lebec Oaks Road and Los Padres Estates – back in the 1940's.

Dick says: "Our mother was Margaret Hart, Peg was 8 and I was 3 when we moved there but I have many wonderful memories of hiking, sledding, the excitement of wrecks on the old Highway 99, rattle snakes, company housing, three refinery fires and going to the new El Tejon School. During our time there, we also had a cabin in Frazier Park to get away from the refinery when we could."

She listed all the families who lived there when they did and wrote, "I remember the big fire at the refinery. Dad woke us up and told us to get our coats and blankets and run toward the highway. That was so exciting for me because I got to sit on top of one of the cars with all the big kids and watch the flames shoot high up into the sky. Firetrucks came from the north and the south. It was like watching fireworks on the 4th of July. We later




learned that our father was nearly killed by a falling insulator and my bike burned in the garage."

1. Lt. Edward Beale crossed this country <u>6</u> times between California and Washington D.C. during the years of 1847 & 1849, to carry military dispatches and the first news of the discovery of gold, <u>by horse</u> through Indian country and <u>by ship</u> when he reached the Gulf of Mexico. After docking, he traveled by coach.

2. Edward Beale brought camels from Texas to Fort Tejon along the first <u>wagon trail</u> through the southwest that was later known as <u>Route 66</u>, and now known as <u>Interstate 40</u>. Shown right is an illustration from Harper's Weekly, 1877.





3. Mr. Beale and President Ulysses Grant would race their
