

REMEMBERING A DEDICATED FOUNDING MEMBER

When Curtis Newman passed away on May 1st, our museum lost one of those who had helped with every phase of the development of our facility. His parents, Roy and Ester Newman, were living in Bakersfield when they found our mountain communities back in 1925 or 26. They had registered their names at a real estate booth at the Kern County Fair and were the winners of a "reduced price lot" in the new Lake of the Woods subdivision (as was everyone who registered!), so they came up to see about it, picked out and bought a lot. The Newmans are known to have built the first cabin, just one room, in Lake of the Woods. (see Spring 2017 RRR)

Curtis was born in 1928 and wrote about those early days in Lake of the Woods as follows:

"My folks built a cabin at Lake of the Woods in 1926 and until 1937 we came up from Bakersfield for long periods in the summer and shorter visits occasionally for the rest of the year – with no electricity or water. Dad did construction work, so could work wherever we settled and there was plenty of building going on up here and in Bakersfield. He would haul timber from the upper sawmill on Mt. Pinos. In early 1937, we expanded the cabin and moved to the area permanently. I started school at the Cuddy place with four other kids. I would ride my horse 'Smarty' to the ranch and put her in the corral with other horses. After school, I would go back and put the bridle on (I rode bare back, being too small for a saddle) and rode home. As there was no water or electricity at Lake of the Woods, we moved into Frazier Park in late 1937 and I attended the 'Lebec School' in Frazier Park through eighth grade – where I met my future wife, Alma Hensley."

After serving in the Navy in World War II, Curtis joined his father in the construction business, constructing many buildings locally. He was the building inspector during the construction of the upper building of the Frazier Park School, as well as for the additions to the Mettler and El Tejon Schools. They built the Burbank Girl Scout Camp Lodge at the top of Cuddy Valley, the Seventh Day Adventist Church, the Moose Lodge and others, all in Lake of the Woods.

When Curtis & Alma were married in 1950, they lived in the little family cabin in Lake of the Woods – still without water and electricity. Alma's family was well known in the area as her mother, Ruby Hensley, served as the Frazier Park postmistress for many years. Curtis & Alma moved away from the area for about 25 years, returning in 1987 to build a beautiful home in front of the original little cabin, both of which remain on the property to this day.

Curtis and Alma Newman (who passed away in 2014) and their parents played a significant role in the founding of our local communities and of the Ridge Route Communities Museum & Historical Society. Curtis oversaw the moving of the original Cuddy log cabin, the first log cabin built in these mountains, piece by piece, to the Museum grounds, and did much of the work to restore it himself. Alma served as the treasurer of RRCM&HS. May they be long remembered.

The family has suggested that memorial contributions in Curtis's name may be made to the Ridge Route Communities Museum & Historical Society or a charity of choice.





THE LATEST FROM THE RIDGE ROUTE PRESERVATION ORGANIZATION

"So far, Summer 2020 isn't shaping up to be what, well, many of us hoped it would be. Things are still moving at least, just a bit slower for the Ridge Route Preservation Organization. We are still working with the USFS to get repairs done and get the utility companies to repair any damage to the roadway they have caused.

In late June, a group of board members took a trip over the Ridge Route from Castaic to Gorman to assess the roadway. To be honest, there was a lot of good news along the roadway to be had. Since the last of the major winter storms have passed, it looks like the roadway has not suffered any major damage. Most of the roadway, with little exception, was easily traversable by a standard automobile. Some sections needed a bit more maneuvering, but were still quite manageable.

The date for our next clean up the Ridge Route event is still unknown. We are presently waiting for the USFS to give us the green light for volunteer events. As it stands, August is likely out for sure. We hope to have something done before the rains begin, but we shall see.

Other ongoing projects include getting the roadway opened, replacing the signage at the markers, and setting up a You Tube channel, are progressing, just slowly. The markers won't be replaced until the roadway is opened. Funding for opening and maintaining the roadway is still unknown at present. The current crisis, health and budgetary, may well impact this more than we'd like. I feel it only delays it. We will push for legislation to force the roadway to be opened if need be.

The gates are still closed and locked. If you find a gate open, do not expect the gate at the other end to be open. Travel is still restricted to nonmotorized travel beyond the gates."

The Museum had hoped to have Mike Ballard present a program in April, which had to be postponed, We are hoping to try again this fall.
