

HOTEL HEYDAY

This is the second article in this series as we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the opening of Hotel Lebec. In the last issue we talked about the founding of this grand hotel, and now we offer some stories of events during the heyday of this amazing gathering place.

The New Year's Eve celebration of December 31st, 1924 was a festive affair at the Hotel with over one hundred couples attending at \$5 a person. A chef was brought from the Waldorf Astoria in New York City and a jazz orchestra provided the music. The Bakersfield newspaper of Thursday, January 1st read:

"Many prominent personages, that form the official as well as the social life of Bakersfield, appeared in the throng of dancers. The tables were tastily decorated and the ballroom was attractively appointed."



In August of 1925 a nine hole golf course was opened out in front of the Hotel with boxing celebrity, Jack Dempsey, world heavy weight champion from 1919-1926, teeing off the first ball.

The BAKERSFIELD CALIFORNIAN article of August 14th read:

"Mr. and Mrs Jack Dempsey, attracted by the perfection of the Hotel Lebec golf course and the scenic beauty of the low rolling hills sloping into the crystal blue lake, will participate in the opening of the course Sunday and attend the sports dinner-dance Saturday evening at the Lebec Lodge. The general public has been invited to participate in the Saturday evening dinnerdance and to take part in the contests and festivities of Sunday."

A few days later the paper reported:

"Jack Dempsey, well known prize fighter, who was invited to help open the course, took a mighty sweep at the gold ball which trickled down the fairway – for a few yards. There was a repressed giggle among the spectators, who were dressed as brilliant as butterflies in sports clothes. Dempsey was no more successful in his second try, but in his third effort, he broke the spell and the ninehole golf course was formally opened."



Numerous film-land greats were said to have stayed at the Hotel over the years that followed, among them Clark Gable and Carole Lombard, Bing Crosby, Jerry Colona, Clara Bow, Rex Bell, Spade

Cooley and Rochester from the Jack Benny Show.



Another regular at the Hotel was Roscoe "Fatty" Arbuckle whose good friend, Max Sennett, had a mountain home over by the present Quail Lake. The two men had done early silent films together.

During Prohibition and the Great Depression, in order to survive in the remote location, the Lebec Hotel developed some notoriety, becoming popular for its gambling, prostitution and the bootleg liquor that was stored under the floor of a nearby cabin.

The Hotel also became the playground of underworld figures such as Benjamin "Bugsy" Siegel – who reportedly brought organized crime to the



West Coast. The rooms over the lobby were illegally outfitted with slot machines, crap and roulette tables along with a membership card that entitled you to all the rights and privileges of "*Club Lebec*". It was said that the "ladies of the night" occupied rooms on the lower level. The late 1930's and into the 1940's the Hotel was the place to go to hear the Big Bands of that era. During the World War II years, the big name bands traveled between San Francisco and Los Angeles entertaining the troops. Most of them had an arrangement with the Lebec Hotel to do one night stands in exchange for free lodging during their travels. It was actually an opportunity for the band to hold a practice that local folks and many from Bakersfield would come to listen to and dance. One fellow stated:

> "What an experience! It will never be equaled. the hey-day of big time orchestras right in Lebec."

Museum supporter, Judi Curtis Petersen – of the local pioneering Curtis family, has shared this wonderful memory of a New Year's Eve at the Hotel after the war years. Judi wrote:

> "I believe it was New Year's Eve 1948 or 49. My parents, Roy and June Curtis, and my grandparents, Roy and Millie Curtis were all dolled up for the dance. Dancing was something I had only seen them do in our living room, but this was something special.


> I remember Daddy driving up the long driveway lit with lights with large white globes and seeing folks dressed in their grandest outfits. Then upon entering the ballroom we saw these huge sparkling chandeliers and beautiful carpet

> My brother and I were allowed to go with them this particular night as there was entertainment for the children in another area of the Hotel. As a child I remember seeing my very first movie picture that night. We saw 'Snow White' and what a grand time we had. It was truly a FAIRYTALE evening."



We have received other such wonderful memories of the Hotel from those interviewed over the years, such as honeymoons there, stranded in snow storms there, etc., but we would like many more. to schedule a clean-up day on the old Ridge Road again. This clean-up will be on the south end of the road at what is known as "Swede's Cut" where a great deal of debris has fallen and threatens to close off that pass.
